Amendment No. 1 to the Program Articulation Agreement between College of Southern Maryland and Salisbury University

This Amendment No. 1, effective this 27th day of May 2022, to the Program Articulation Agreement ("Agreement") in effect from 2018 through 2023, between College of Southern Maryland and Salisbury University.

The parties amend the Agreement as follows:

- 1. Article I. Academic Requirements, Section E, is deleted in its entirety.
- 2. Article III. General Provisions, is amended to add the following Section G:

"Any student completing their A.A. or A.S. degree will have completed the general education requirements of Salisbury University."

Sections previously numbered III(G) through III(M), are renumbered III(H) through III(N).

- 3. Appendix 1. Articulation Matrix, is deleted in its entirety.
- 4. Appendix 2. Salisbury University Bachelor of Arts in Social Work Checklist, is deleted in its entirety.

The parties further agree that Appendix 1A Section (or in this case, Appendix 1A) is hereby deleted and replaced in its entirety with this Amendment 1.

This constitutes the entire Amendment No. 1 to the Agreement. Any modifications to this Amendment No. 1 or additional modifications to the Agreement must be in writing and signed by both parties.
