ACADEMIC PROGRAM ARTICULATION AGREEMENT BETWEEN College of Southern Maryland AND

Bowie State University REGARDING TRANSFER FROM Associate of Arts in General Studies: Criminal Justice TO Bachelor of Sciences in Criminal Justice

This Academic Program Articulation Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into by and between College of Southern Maryland (the "Sending Institution") and Bowie State University (the "Receiving Institution") (collectively, the "Institutions") to facilitate the transfer of academic credits from Associate of Arts in General Studies: Criminal Justice for the completion of Bachelor of Sciences in Criminal Justice (the "Program(s)").

A. Qualifying Students

This Agreement pertains to the transfer of "Qualifying Students", i.e., those students who:

- 1. Have successfully completed the program at the Sending Institution;
- 2. Are enrolled in the Sending Institution, in good standing;
- 3. Maintain a 2.0 cumulative grade point average; and
- 4. Are accepted for admission to the Receiving Institution

B. Responsibilities of the Institutions

The Institutions agree to implement the transfer of Qualifying Students in accordance with applicable law and the following requirements and protocols:

- 1. A Qualifying Student may transfer into from the Transferring Institution into the Receiving Institution for the completion of the Program.
- 2. Courses that the Receiving School will accept credits for towards completion of the Program include:

Students will choose a concentration as well to complete.

*Receiving Institution must indicate if course is applied to General Education, Program/Major requirements, or General Elective.

- 3. Per the Code of Maryland Regulations (COMAR), the Receiving Institution will accept General Education courses from the Sending Institution and the Receiving Institution will count these towards General Education requirements at the Receiving Institution. As well, it is recommended that students participating in this articulation agreement utilize the Arts/Humanities General Education options to complete two history courses.
- 4. Bowie State University will offer all the courses in the Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice with a Forensic Science concentration at the University System of Maryland in Southern Maryland.
- 5. The Receiving Institution and the Sending Institution agree to publicize this program.
- 6. The Receiving Institution will establish a mechanism to provide information on the academic progress of the Sending Institution's students enrolled as a result of this agreement.
- 7. The Receiving Institution shall designate, and shall provide to the Sending Institution, the contact information for a staff person at the Receiving Institution who is responsible for the oversight of the transfer of Qualifying Students. - 8. If the Qualifying Student is using federal Title 38 VA Education Benefits (GI Bill® Education Benefits), the Institutions shall adhere to all applicable U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs' regulations, including the regulations governing the awarding prior credit, as regulated under Title 38, Code of Federal Regulations, Sections 21.4253(d)(3) and 21.4254(c)(4).
- 9. Each Institution shall adhere to all applicable transfer requirements set forth in the Annotated Code of Maryland and the Code of Maryland Regulations.
- 10. Each Institution shall advise students regarding transfer opportunities under this Agreement, and shall advise students of financial aid opportunities and implications associated with the transfer.
- 11. Should either Institution make changes to program requirements, the institution will inform the partner institution immediately. The articulation agreement should be updated to reflect the changes and forwarded to the Maryland Higher Education Commission.

C. Term and Termination

- 1. This agreement shall be effective on the date that it is signed by the appropriate and authorized representatives of each Institution.
- 2. Either Institution may, at its sole discretion, terminate this Agreement upon delivering 60 days written notice to the other Institution and the Maryland Higher Education Commission.
- 3. Both Institutions agree to meet once every 3 year(s) to review the terms of this agreement.

D. Amendment

- The Institutions agree to provide copies of this Agreement to all relevant individuals and departments of the Institutions, including but not limited to students, academic department chairs participating in the transfer, offices of the president, registrar's offices, and financial aid offices.

H. No Third-Party Beneficiaries

There are no third-party beneficiaries to this Agreement.

I. Representations and Warranties of the Parties

Both Institutions represent and warrant that the following shall be true and correct as of the Effective Date of this Agreement, and shall continue to be true and correct during the term of this Agreement:

 The Institutions are and shall remain in compliance with all applicable federal, state, and local statutes, laws, ordinances, and regulations relating to this Agreement, as amended from time to time.
